Elie Weisel was born in Sighed, Romania in 1928. He grew up in a small town. He did a lot of things with his family. But they were destroyed from the deportation of his town in 1944. He and his family where deported to Auschwitz in Poland. Elie and his father where separated from his mother and little sister, Tzipora. He was only 15 and never saw his mother or sister again. The following year he was transported to the concentration camps in Buna, Gleiwitz and Buchenwald. He was lucky enough to stay with his father until he died from starvation. Elie was liberated from Buchenwald by the United States 3rd Army in 1945.

After the war Elie found out that his mother and his younger sister where killed in the gas chambers, but his to older sisters survived. For a couple of years he lived in an Orphanage. In 1948 he began to study literature, philosophy, and psychology at the Sorbonne in Paris. He supported himself by becoming a journalist, writing for the a French newspaper. Elie said he would never write about what happened to him in the Holocaust, but in 1955 he wrote, And the World Remained Silent. Which tells all his experience at the concentration camps. In his book he wrote "never shall I forget that night the first night in camp. Which has turned my life into one long night seven times cursed and seven times sealed never shall I forget that smoke."

The landing was an amphibious assault by the Allied nations on five different beach areas with Allied soldiers landing by air behind enemy lines and by sea landing on the beaches. The United States led the of the landing on the beaches Omaha and Utah. The main Allied countries that where involved on the landing at Normandy where the Untied Kingdom, Canada, and the United States. Once the Allied forces landed on the beaches they had a huge welcoming party with 50 Divisions of German troops with machine guns and heavy artillery barrages to take out the landing crafts and the ships they where

James E. Mrazek arrived at Camp Claiborne July 25th 1944 to take command of the airborne training of the 84th Infantry Division. He found a great training area for him to work. There were two rows of C6-4a glider mockups. They were the wooden frames resembling the body of a glider. They also had four removable benches just like the real ones. He thought that there was about 100 of them. There was also several rows with C-46 and C-47 mockups. There was a building in between the rows where you could conduct the training. They had some platforms that we had demonstration equipment to practice with. Right across from there, there was a landing strip for the gliders. The high general was General Alexander Bolling. James trained the squadron over the General. After about a month he had processed more than 25 battalions. They now had over 15,000 men. General Bolling offered him a place in the 84th but he didn't want to take it because his squadron, the 13th, was going over seas.
